President's Message: George Richey PLA Summer Activities & Volunteer Opportunities

The Pentwater Lake Association (PLA) has a lot of activities planned for this year and is in need of volunteer help for most of them. The testing evaluates the level of phosphorus, nitrogen and other chemicals in the water and is done several times during the year. We have a very active social committee that plans PLA attendance at various community events, the PLA Annual Membership Meeting (June 16) at Park Place, and our annual Strawberry Shortcake Fundraiser (August 10) on the Village Green. A new standing committee was formed at our last Board meeting for the Friends of the Pentwater River Watershed. The "Friends" is chaired by Rich Pugsley, our PLA Treasurer. Rich has been organizing and directing the fund raising efforts to create a Riparian Survey to begin the process of developing a River Watershed Management Plan. Future activities that will need volunteers include river water flow monitoring, E-coli tracking, sediment source studies, road/ stream crossing surveys, and water testing for weed treatment chemicals. Rich will be developing the schedule for these activities and can be reached at 586-255-2642.

The PLA promotes a Clean Boats/Clean Waters program by manning table displays of relevant information in July and August at our Lake's three public launch sites. The goal is to get boat owners to Clean/Drain/Dry their boats and trailers, "before entering" and "after leaving" our Lake. The volunteers would set up the tables and distribute the handouts to boat owners during several busy summer weekends.

2022 Annual Pentwater State of the Lake Report by Joe Primozich

The year started out with cold winter temperatures that created 10 inches of black ice, perfect for ice fishing. The February 17th perch contest drew close to 100 fisherman and was a success. No run of white belly perch were caught from Lake Michigan. This is a pattern over the last three years. Snowmobiles and four wheel quads were used by many fishing on the lake. By the first week of March the warmup came after 6 weeks of safe ice fishing activity.

Lake plant surveys began on June 6. A cool spring delayed the lake plant emergence and so it did not warrant any invasive plant control measures in June. The second survey was done on July 18. This allowed for harvesters to come in from July 26-29. <u>This was the third year that 140 wet tons of starry stonewort were removed</u> <u>from the lake.</u> In doing so, the plant removal also takes phosphorous out of the lake, a key ingredient for algae blooms at the end of the summer. So the benefit of harvesting is two fold 1) with the removal of the nuisance plants and 2) the reduction of the phosphorous load in the lake to slow down any future poisonous algae blooms in the lake like that of October of 2010. Also, on July 28, 6.25 acres were chemically treated for hybrid milfoil and/or nuisance native plants. This is in line with the goals of the mission statement of the Pentwater Lake Improvement Board (PLIB), namely that any chemical shoreline treatment will be kept below 15 acres or (15 %) of the shoreline annually.

The Pentwater Lake Association Youth Fishing Contest ran from June 11 through August 14. All catches are laid on a ruler and pictures taken and then texted to PLA committee members. Youth have to be 16 or under to be eligible. Seventeen trophies were awarded for 12 species this year. Perch, bluegills, crappie, sunfish, and rock bass were the most often caught. For the first time more large mouth bass were caught than small mouth bass. The question was raised, are bass tournament teams catching small mouth bass here, and then returning to the site of the weigh-in taking too many mature fish out of the lake, so they do not return? We can observe as we go forward whether the small mouth bass numbers rebound.

An aquatic plant survey was done on the lake for the second year on August 31. The frequency of the 6 invasive plant species was outlined. The most common are two native plants called coontail and wild celery (see photo at right). They seem to be the best competition to out produce the two invasive plants we try to control, which are starry stonewort and hybrid milfoil. We plan to keep this survey going to try to learn what natural changes do occur in managing invasive plants in Pentwater Lake. As we all should know, invasive species are here and we must learn to live with them. The PLIB mission statement is "to manage for the health of all the lake species both plant and animal." Special thanks to the PLIB Board for passing a strong mission statement and to the PLA Board for their field work on the lake and a watchful eye on the changes seen.



Boat & Water Safety by Tim Simon, Oceana County Sheriff's Office, Marine Patrol

As we get ready to kick off our 2023 summer season in Oceana County, it is hard not to think about those hot summer days and warm summer nights. With all the hot days summer brings, we can't help but think water is a luxury we have, being a lakeshore county in Michigan. Spending time in and around the water is great way to recreate and relax, as long as we are doing it safely.

One of the most popular summer activities is visiting our beautiful beaches in Oceana County. One of our most popular beaches is right here in Pentwater at Charles Mears State Park. One of the first things we need to check when we visit Charles Mears State Park, if we plan on going in the water, is the flagging system of green, yellow, and red flags. This tells us whether the swimming conditions are safe for the day or if it is too hazardous to be in the water. If a green flag is posted the conditions are usually safe for swimming. If a yellow flag is posted, swimmers should use caution as rip currents are possible. If a red flag is posted, swimmers should not enter the water as conditions are too hazardous and rip currents are likely.

Another thing we need to think about while at Charles Mears State Park, is to stay away from the pier heads while swimming in the water. This can be very dangerous for many reasons. Piers cause structural currents which can rapidly force water outward into the lake. If swimmers are in this area, they can be swept out quickly to deeper water and become fatigued. Boaters congregate in the areas around the pier heads and it is difficult for boaters to see people in the water. It is always best, if swimming, to stay inside the marked swimming area. And lastly, never walk onto the pier structure if the conditions are so turbulent that water is washing over the pier. A person can easily be swept off the pier and into the lake when water washes over the pier.

Another great activity on our hot summer days is boating in its many forms. From letting the wind push your sailboat to gliding across the water on your personal watercraft. There is no better place to be than in the water. There are some things that we need to remember when we are boating this summer. First and foremost, we need to remember to wear a personal flotation device (life jacket) when out on the water in any type of vessel. Children under the age of six must always wear a type I or II personal flotation device when out on any type of vessel on the water. You never know when an emergency will arise, and having a personal flotation device already on could save your life.

As boaters, we have several important "rules of the road" while navigating on the water in Michigan. First, is the "one-hundred-foot rule". Unless you are navigating at slow no-wake speed, it is prohibited to go within one hundred feet of anything stationary, like a dock, raft, person in the water, the shoreline, or another anchored boat. As boaters, we need to be mindful of the wake our boat broadcasts as we travel around the lake. Large boat wakes can rapidly erode our shoreline.

We also need to remember to go counterclockwise around the lake when towing someone behind our vessels. This ensures everyone is going the same direction, so if someone falls into the water off water skis or a tube, other following boaters will see and have ample time to maneuver around them.

Next, specifically to Pentwater, we need to be mindful of Pentwater Lake's No Wake Zone. This No Wake Zone runs to the west from the Pentwater Municipal Boat Launch, through the harbor, out to Lake Michigan. Boats can only travel at slow, no wake speed, through this area. It is marked by non-lateral buoys.

Lastly, be courteous on the water as we share it with all boaters and swimmers. Always keep a sharp lookout while navigating your boat and have a safe summer season.

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The Oceana County Sheriff's Marine Patrol Boat. Deputy Tim Simon patrols in Pentwater Thursday—Sunday. He reminds boaters to have visual distress signals (flares) available on their boats at all times.


I met with Tim to discuss his article and ask him some questions. He said there were so many more things he could have written about, but he chose to focus on what he thought was most important and on behaviors (boaters and swimmers) that most often put people in danger. For boaters that included the 100-foot-rule for distance from any fixed object, driving counterclockwise around the lake when towing people, wearing life jackets, and simply being courteous to everyone else on the lake. For swimmers it included observing the flag warnings, keeping far from the rocks along the piers, and staying in the designated swim areas. Simon said marine officers have rescued countless swimmers at Mears State Park who ignored these basic safety rules.

In response to my question about boating "right of way" safety, Simon said power boats must yield to sailboats except in two cases: when the sailboat is motored down or when the sailboat is overtaking a slower boat, such as a charter fishing boat with numerous fishing lines in the water.

Normally inland lakes are regulated by state laws and the Great Lakes are regulated by federal laws. But Pentwater Lake is one of a few Michigan lakes that has a navigable channel to Lake Michigan. That makes it a federal waterway and therefore subject to both state and federal regulations. Discretion is used when these regulations conflict with each other such as age requirements for life jackets: federal law requires them for 12 years and younger, whereas state law requires them for 6 years and younger.

Any motion on the water causes wave action. Different water sports require and/or cause different size wakes. Rich Pugsley wisely points out that the boat census report made by Tom Walters in this issue (pg 6) highlights

the importance of learning to use the lake safely to protect each other and the lake. The Pentwater Lake Association Bullseye Chart (Wake Zones for Boaters on Pentwater Lake) is an important tool for the protection of all. The chart zones can help different types of watercrafts <u>safely operate</u> on the water at the same time. The chart zones can also <u>protect the environ-</u> <u>ment</u> from negative effects on shoreline erosion, sediment resuspension, aquatic plants, and aquatic invasive species. <u>Editor's notes</u>



How Many Boats Do We Have? By Tom Walter

Mid-summer of 2022, late July, Joe Primozich and I began collecting data to "Score the Shore." Score the Shore is a standardized way of measuring the environmental health of a lake's shoreline. By then I had divided the entire length of the shoreline, using a GPS, into 28 - 1000' sections and saved the documentation. We collected data for each section closely following the instructions provided by the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP). Those instructions eliminate from scoring, places like the Apache Hills Canal and the portion of the lake servicing the Snug Harbor and Charlie's Marina. The results of our efforts are now posted on the CLMP website. <u>CLMP-Pentwater-Oceana-640089.pdf (micorps.net)</u>

As we worked our way around the lake it became evident that we have a lot of docks and a lot of boats. We were counting the docks but not in the Canal and Marina. We were not counting the boats. In addition, over a period of time, we had been fielding questions and statements like "the number of wake boats is exploding," and "how many jets ski are there and how many do we need?" and "aren't there more mooring buoys this year?" and "how many deep draft sailboats are there?" So, we came up with an idea to do a Boat Count.

We stratified our count. We counted wake boats, power boats, jet skis, deep draft sailboats, other sailboats, row boats, paddle craft, transient boats, plus mooring buoys in the Village and mooring buoys in the Township. Definitions are included at the bottom of Table 1.

It seems this count could have some value. The definitions could be changed but should be settled upon to have consistent results over time. Some questions can be answered and the count provides some food for thought. Ponder the results. Let me know what you think. The results are in Table 1 below.

Power Boats = all powered boats except motored dinghys tethered to another boat and wake boats

Large Sailboats = those thought to have in excess of 6' draft

Small Sailboats = all sailboats thought to have less than 6' draft

Paddle Craft = kayaks, paddle boards, canoes, water wheelers visibly stored at waterfront, available for use

Row Boat = a small boat with oar locks and oars

Wake Boat = a boat whose design and intention is to create wakes for wakeboarders, usually with a wake board tower and attachments to enhance wake creation.

Commercial Vessels = work equipment, Adams Marine, Viking Marine

<u>We also counted moorings:</u> There were 38 Village Buoy Moorings, 22 Township Buoy Moorings, and 7 Moored Swim Rafts.

The Shore is Scored.....What's Next? By Tom Walter

The Cooperative Lake Monitoring Program (CLMP) has recently posted our 2022 data on the web. It can be found at <u>CLMP-Pentwater-Oceana-640089.pdf (micorps.net)</u>. Pentwater Lake scored a 51 out of 100 with the statewide average being 70. Our need for improvement was evident as we conducted the survey. The CLMP report said the following about our lake:


Analysis Specific to Pentwater Lake: Overall, the lakeshore habitat of Pentwater Lake is **below average** when compared to the other lakes in the program with similar amount of development. One half of the lake sections scored Poor, indicating there is plenty of room for improvement on Pentwater Lake (14 sections scored poor, 12 scored fair, 2 scored good). There is no particular area of the habitat score that is particularly strong or weak; but rather there is a general degradation of habitat around the whole lake and across these different categories of Riparian (57/100), Littoral (42/100), and Erosion Control (54/100).

To improve scores, residents should work on all three categories. Keep native plants in the shallows, allow unmowed areas to grow on the shoreline, and remove sea walls or add rock or wood whenever possible. You can get plenty of ideas for improving shoreline health from the Michigan Natural Shoreline Partnership (<u>https://</u> <u>www.shorelinepartnership.org/</u>). I know, it is disappointing. We live in a beautiful community, with nice homes and nice boats, nice families and a lot of fun. We love the lake and pay a lot to be here. What we don't do is pay enough attention to the natural environment and how we effect it. That's the **bad news**.

The **good news** is that it isn't that hard or expensive to make some changes that will reflect good stewardship of the lake we love. In addition, we have some help. Your Lake Association, Pentwater Lake Improvement Board and Pentwater Township are into making improvements. Cost sharing is a possibility. Private land owners' participation will be needed as there isn't much that is public besides some road ends.

Things to be considered are bioengineered shoreline protection and planting in un-armored shoreline areas, rock in front of seawalls, adding wood to the shoreline and planting a portion of the water's edge with native species. These things would improve all 3 areas that were scored. It all can be done while keeping your property beautiful and don't fear the wood. Wood doesn't have to be a whole ugly dead tree.

Please, think about what you can do or allow. Check out the links above. See what has been done elsewhere. We'll talk about it more. Be part of the solution.... not the other part.



The Fish Run – Clayton Lubbers*

Have you ever wondered what makes some kinds of fish swim back up the streams and tributaries to where they were spawned and hatched? The technical term for fish that do that is "adfluvial."

You can find adfluvial fish no matter where you live. Many species run from the oceans into fresh water to spawn. Probably the most famous are the salmon species - those fish that make spectacular leaps over rapids and dams as they make their way back to their spawning waters. This might be news to some, but the salmon we find in the Midwest, including the Great Lakes, are not native. They all come from the Atlantic or Pacific Ocean stock fish that were brought to inland waters. Though native to the oceans, salmon are famous for their powerful runs up rivers, streams, and tributaries so they can lay eggs in the same waters where they were hatched. These are the fish you probably think of when you see grizzly bears and brown bears along streams and tributaries waiting to catch fish during the fall salmon run.

Adfluvial fish don't run only in the fall, though; many species of adfluvial fish also run in the spring. Northern pike, walleye, and steelhead trout are some species of adfluvial fish that spawn in the spring.

People have wondered for a long time how adfluvial fish know how to return to the same streams where they were hatched. Most scientists believe it has to do with the scents in the streams – subtle clues that remind a fish of where they came from and where they are going. Each stream has a uniqueness to it based on the trees, plants, rocks, and soil where it lies. Each stream has unique flavors and tell-tale signs that let the fish know where they belong.
